


Recycling Goals

- 403.706, F.S.
 - The Legislature set a 75% statewide recycling goal for **municipal solid waste** by 2020.
 - Municipal solid waste is generated by residential, commercial, and institutional sources. (It does <u>not</u> include industrial or manufacturing waste.)
 - For 2015, the threshold recycling rate is 50%. For 2016 and 2017, it increases to 60%. For 2018 and 2019, it goes to 70%. For 2020, it will be 75%.
 - The Legislature also set that same goal for all counties over 100,000 population.
 - The Legislature has directed all counties to report their recycling progress to DEP annually.

Calculating the Recycling Rate

50% by 2015 60% by 2017 70% by 2019 75% by 2020




- Each ton of MSW recycled receives 1 ton recycling credit
- Each ton of MSW used as a processed fuel or fuel or fuel substitute receives 1 ton recycling credit
- Each ton of MSW used as landfill cover receives 1 ton of recycling credit
- Each MWH generated receives 1 ton recycling credit
 - If a county reaches or exceeds a 50% recycling rate by means other than renewable energy, they receive 1.25 tons per MWH generated



Florida's 2014 Recycling Rate


- The statewide
 overall recycling
 rate, which includes
 renewable energy*
 recycling credits,
 increased from 49%
 (2013) to 50% (2014)
 - The Legislature set an interim benchmark recycling goal of 50% for calendar year 2014 and 60% for calendar year 2016
- The statewide <u>traditional</u> recycling rate, which <u>excludes</u> renewable energy recycling credits, increased from 38% (2013) to 39% (2014)



^{*}Electricity produced from MSW or landfill gas



2014 Tons Municipal Solid Waste (by decreasing **Population**)




- About half of the counties (34 out of 67 total) are over 100,000 population
- Those 34 counties have 95% of the state's population and generate 95% of the state's municipal solid waste



Florida's MSW Waste Composition



Florida Municipal Solid Waste Collected (2014) (32.2 million tons)



Waste Managed in FL (2014)


- The amount of **municipal solid waste** <u>collected</u> increased from 31.3 million tons to 32.2 million tons, or 3%
- Out of that amount collected, the amount <u>recycled</u> also increased, from 11.8 million tons to 12.6 million tons, or 6%





MSW Collected by Generator Type in Florida (2014)

• The <u>commercial</u> sector recycling rate increased from 51% in 2013 to 56% in 2014 (this includes renewable energy recycling credits). The <u>residential single family</u> recycling rate increased from 42% to 46%.

RBAC - Recycling Business Assistance Center 70% by 2019

- Objective: Develop and support new markets for recycling to achieve
 75% recycling goal by 2020
- Activities:
 - Maintain RBAC website and resources
 - Florida Recycling Loan Program
 - Small business loans to for profit companies
 - Florida based, <\$6m, and <100 employees
 - From \$20,000 to \$200,000 at up to 2% below Prime



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Recycling Recognition Program

- Recycling Recognition Program
 - Encourage organizations and citizens to increase recycling
 - Data collection through DEP Business Recycling Tracking Tool (Re-TRAC)
- DEP's Recycling Recognition Program has focused on publicly recognizing "outstanding" recycling efforts from what is commonly called the commercial sector.
 - That sector includes businesses and institutions in both the public and private sector.
- DEP's definition of "outstanding" recycling efforts is tied to the **interim benchmark recycling goals** established by the Legislature.


